I know many people have questions about St. Asaph's finances and so to help explain our current situation, I've pulled together some of the questions I've been asked lately about the church's financial picture.

Where did all our investments go? I thought we had a big endowment.

Through the middle of 2007, St. Asaph's did have a large endowment—at one point, the total was approximately \$1.7 million dollars. But those were paper profits reflecting the value of the stocks in which we had been invested. Unfortunately, most of that profit was never captured by selling the shares or diversifying our portfolio into bonds and other less volatile investments. When the stock market crashed in the fall of 2007, like many institutions, we were hit hard and we lost more than \$500,000 in value by the end of 2007 as the value of the stocks in our portfolio decreased. The stock prices continued to decrease in 2008 before they stabilized (at a lower level) in 2009. We had also committed to fund our portion of the Bala Build project in the spring of 2008 and we had to liquidate just under \$700,000 to pay our portion of the costs. The combination of these two events: the stock market crash and the Bala Build, really hit our portfolio hard.

When did we begin to run a deficit budget?

The reality is that St. Asaph's has run a deficit budget for many years. (By deficit, I mean spending more than we take in yearly income from pledge, rent, and other income). I have only been a member of the parish for nine years, but I know that we have liquidated assets to pay for operating expenses every year I've been a member, and those who have been here longer assure me that we relied on our investments to pay operating costs for some years before I arrived; and, the amount of that deficit has been about the same for a number of years--\$100,000. So it isn't that we are spending more now than we did in the past—we just have less money to fund our deficit than we did in previous years.

Where does our money go? What are our major expenses?

Half of our budget (\$200,000) goes to cover the costs of our five employees: the priest, the administrator, the music/arts director, and our two part-time Church School administrators. In addition to salary, this amount includes health insurance for the priest and music director, pension for the priest, and other expenses like disability insurance and the church's share of payroll taxes. Another 25% (\$100,000) of our budget goes to building expenses—not just repairs but also insurance, security, cleaning, and utilities. The last 25% covers everything else: the paid choir, office expenses, our obligations to the diocese, and all the other little things such as liturgical supplies, Sunday school supplies, hospitality, and our expenses associated with the art openings.

Hasn't the vestry made any cuts to our budget? If we're in such bad shape, why does everything seem the same?

The vestry has undertaken cost cutting measures that were intentionally meant to not be too visible; the idea was to limit expenses but not damage the essential fabric of the parish. So, for example, the music budget was trimmed and we decided not to hire a bookkeeper. And we've done a good job controlling our expenses; at the end of September, we were \$50,000 under budget for expenses overall, even after excluding large expenses that are not yet due.

What are our revenue sources?

Our largest source (69%) of our revenue comes from congregational giving: pledge and other gifts that come in on Sundays. This is the reason it is so important that members pay their pledge regularly; when pledge income falls, we simply can't make our payroll or pay our bills. The next largest item of revenue (18%) is the rent received from the Bala House. The balance of our income comes from other rent (the sexton's apartment, AA, and the occasional rentals of our space) and our investments. We would like to increase rental income from our space and to that end are working on new rental policies. But we need to get the word out that we have good space to rent so please make other groups and individuals aware of our space and that it is available to rent! We need to get the word out in the community that we have meeting and event space available.

If you have other questions, or need more information about these topics, please know that I am always available to answer questions about the church's financial situation at any time. Please just email me or call or grab me at coffee hour. I will also continue to set up opportunities for informal discussions about finances; please watch the bulletin for announcements of the next Q and A session.

The second St. Francis day celebration at 5 pm was the blessing of the animals. Prayers were given, poems were read and the animals were set for another year.



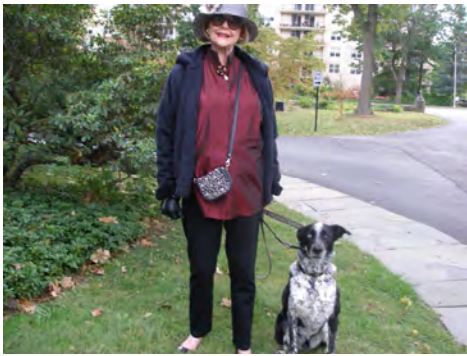

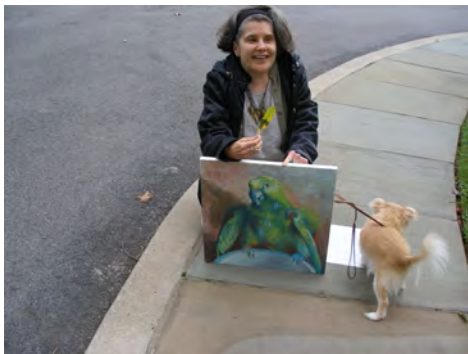

Children's Formation

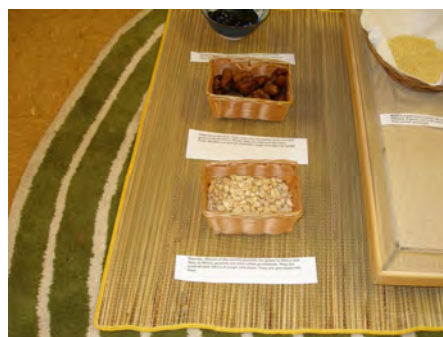

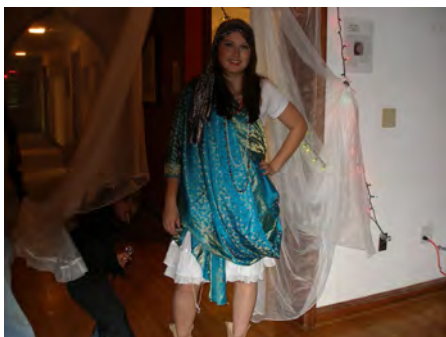

I personally feel we continue to be a close-knit and loving extended family even as we welcome new people to the parish. We are diverse in many aspects, but I fondly believe there are allies here for everyone. Just as within a family, you are bound to have a favorite aunt or a favorite sibling, I see affinity groups here which are never walled off; indeed, all these groups are eager to add to their number. So here is a special call to anyone who wants to become more involved: Add your name to a sign-up list; Ask a contact person for more information; Invite someone else to do coffee hour with you; Come to the next Saturday Parish Work Day; and SIGN A PLEDGE CARD

Pledge cards should be returned by or on All Saints Day, November 7th. When considering your pledge, figure out what an actual tithe (10%) of your income would be. If you cannot manage to give that much, divide the tithe by 2 and consider giving 5%. If you have never pledged, you might start with the price of a meal out or a movie each week and work your way up. It is vitally necessary for the parish to be able to create a budget based on our income, and our income depends on the generosity of us all.

Pledge cards may be returned to the parish office, handed to a Stewardship Committee member, or simply placed in the collection plate.

Philabundance Garden



Barry announced in church that our Philabundance garden was the 4th highest producer of food among the pick-up sites. We weighed in at 600 lbs. of food donated.

According to a recent study as reported in the Philadelphia Inquirer: *At a time when more people in America are suffering from hunger, the First Congressional District is one of the hungriest, second only to the Bronx, N.Y., according to the Gallup-Healthways Well-Being Index, an ongoing national poll done in conjunction with the Food Research and Action Center in Washington.* St. Christopher's Hospital in Philadelphia is in the First District.

A pediatrician at St. Christopher's, **Dr. Renee Turchi**, had this to say: "Too many families here must choose between rent and food. Lack of food hurts brain development in young children. Without enough food for our kids, we are fostering a cycle of failure for the entire city."

You can see from the above recent newspaper account that for a long time St. Asaph's has recognized a need for alleviating hunger and our small church with our small community has engaged in one large effort in the last three summers to do our part. **Wendy and Katherine** who were major players continue to thank all who made the garden possible this year and thanks to our two rental gardens for their gifts to Philabundance.

In 1972, Ella moved west. During that time she traveled to many western states with an interest in further education in the arts and the spectacular landscapes there. She directed a Cultural Center for a small community in the sierra foothills, and created after school enrichment programs for many school districts in the area.

Ella left her career in arts administration in 1993, and began painting. Her love of nature and the outdoors led to a passion for plein air painting. Ella has painted in many spectacular areas of the United States, including Death Valley, the coast of California, Washington's Puget Sound, the Tetons of Wyoming, Cape Cod in Massachusetts and her homeland, the Pocono

Mountains of Pennsylvania. For over a decade watercolor was her main medium as she studied all other painting medium. She currently uses mixed medium to express the beauty of the area where she now resides, on the Lehigh River in Pennsylvania.

During these years of prolific painting, Ella returned to teaching and became a reading specialist. She upgraded her Fine Arts credential to a Multi-subject credential and began to specialize in reading. She raised two sons then, with her husband Stan Miller. In 2007, she retired from teaching and moved from California to Pennsylvania. She currently enjoys an interest in photography and the land where she lives continues to inspire her painting and drawing. She will be directing an Art Program for the Pocono Lake Preserve next year.

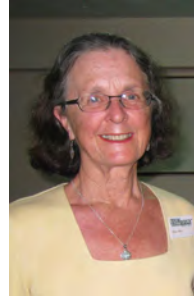

Diocesan Middle East Study Group



The series offered at St. Asaph's by The Middle East Study Group of the Diocese of PA to raise awareness about the plight of the Palestinians has been well attended, both by parishioners and by others in the greater Philadelphia area. St. Asaph's has gained a good deal of positive

exposure by our willingness to risk showing support for what some consider a provocative issue, especially in our immediate neighborhood. Many thanks to Barry for his calm presence and unwavering conviction that we are doing the right thing. I am delighted to report that we have received no hostile visitors, and we have offered reassurance to not a few Palestinians here (Muslim and Christian) that they are not pariahs and that they have allies among American Christians. I'd like to pass on to the parish the many warm expressions of gratitude I have received on your behalf. Let us continue to stand for peace and justice throughout the world.

Our next event will be on Nov. 11th in the Parish Hall at 7:30 pm. The Sa'adeh family is coming from their home in Bethlehem (the West Bank) to tell about life under occupation, but more especially about their dedication to the Bereaved Families Circle. This is a growing association of Israelis and Palestinians who have lost family members because of the conflict which has continued far too long. Numbering already in the hundreds and growing, they are all convinced that war will not settle their problems, so they advocate peaceful resistance to further expansion of settlements. Jews and Palestinians both must overcome numerous obstacles to meet together. Many Palestinians are refused entry into Israel to meet, so Israelis have to face down their fear and trust their allies in order to cross into the West Bank just to talk. Both sides work fearlessly and tirelessly among their own people, espousing an unpopular philosophy in hope of developing a just and peaceful society for all.

Marion and Shiva Stone are twin brothers born of a secret union between a beautiful Indian nun and a brash British surgeon at a mission hospital in Addis Ababa. Orphaned by their mother’s death in childbirth and their father’s disappearance, bound together by a preternatural connection and a shared fascination with medicine, the twins come of age as Ethiopia hovers on the brink of revolution. Yet it will be love, not politics—their passion for the same woman—that will tear them apart and force Marion, fresh out of medical school, to flee his homeland. He makes his way to America, finding refuge in his work as an intern at an underfunded, overcrowded New York City hospital. When the past catches up to him—nearly destroying him—Marion must entrust his life to the two men he thought he trusted least in the world: the surgeon father who abandoned him and the brother who betrayed him.
